WELCOME FROM THE CHOIR



Welcome to this our first concert for 2011 containing a varied cross-section of works by Handel. *Dixit Dominus* is a dazzling musical gem written for five soloists,

choir and orchestra; a challenging but rewarding piece for the performers. The other selections chosen from Handel's vast repertoire nicely complement the title piece. We hope that you enjoy this smorgasbord of Handel's music.

We are looking forward with great anticipation to our Italian tour in September this year. Starting in Milan and finishing in Rome, we will take in as many of the delights of northern Italy as we can manage in two weeks. Exact details of performances on tour are still being worked out, but we will definitely be doing a great deal of singing along the way, some shared with local groups.

We have two major fundraisers planned

for the year, the first to enable us get everyone on tour, and the second to assist us to minimise ticket prices for our regular concerts. Caffè Bella Melodia is an afternoon tea with light entertainment, all with an Italian flavour. It promises to be good fun for all. The Armed Man 'from scratch' is this year's Come and Sing offering. The Lord said unto my Lord...

GEORGE FRIDERIC HANDEL (1685-1759) was born in Germany in the same year as Johann Sebastian Bach. His early musical training was in private, as his father strictly forbade him to meddle with any musical instrument. He managed to get a small clavichord which he hid in a room at the top of the house. He very quickly became a skilful performer on the harpsichord and pipe organ. On a visit to a relative of Handel's, George Frideric's playing on the keyboard attracted the attention of Duke Johann Adolf I of Weissenfels.

Handel's father finally agreed to allow Handel to have lessons in musical composition and keyboard technique. In 1698, Handel played for Frederick I of Prussia and in 1701 Georg Philipp Telemann went to Halle to listen to the important young man.

During the first decade of the 1700s, Handel held positions of organist at cathedrals in Germany and made his first visit to Italy in 1706. It was in 1707, at the age of 22, that Handel wrote the first work to be performed in today's concert, Dixit Dominus, HWV232. Handel separates the text of Psalm 109 (Vulgate) into nine movements. Handel carefully distributes the use of the chorus as the pillars of this work (similar to Bach in his cantatas of this time) and also has the chorus act as contributors to the drama of the text of the Psalm (as we see in oratorios and operas that came later in Handel's career and beyond). From the opening orchestral bars, Handel creates a rhythmic drive through the juxtaposition of chorus and soloists, which is repeated many times, yet never becomes monotonous. The second and third movements are for alto and soprano solo - Virgam virtutis tuae (The Lord shall send the rod of thy power out of Zion) and Tecum principium (In the day of thy power). The second movement, with its sparse continuo accompaniment, is contrasted by the third movement, which uses a flowing motif in the violins to propel the musical line forward in a humble way.

The dramatic chords which open the



fourth movement (The Lord has sworn an oath) guickly move into an almost nagging section (that will not repent). These two sections occur twice throughout this movement and set the way for the two contrasting motifs of movement 5. The tension that arises through the piling up of harmonic suspensions in movement 6 portrays the anguish that is coupled with the text 'The Lord at your right hand destroys Kings on the day of his wrath' The seventh movement is composed using imitative entries similar to that of a fugue (an archaic compositional device) for the text describing the judgement among the heathens. In the middle of this section, however, the ruins fall (cascading three note motifs) and the skulls scatter on many lands. The mood is quickly altered in the eighth movement, as the slowly pulsating strings gradually change the harmonic direction with the soprano soloists gliding over this fundamental layer. The complete work comes to an end with the Gloria patri in a magnificent display of repetitive motifs,





as the soprano line continues to move into its uppermost range.

To end the first half of today's programme, Laura Coutts and Monique Latemore will sing two stunning arias from Handel's Rinaldo (composed in 1711) and Xerxes (first performed in 1738). Rinaldo was Handel's first Italian opera specifically composed for the London stage. Lascia ch'io pianga is sung by Almirena, the daughter of Goffredo. Goffredo has promised Almirena's hand to the knight Rinaldo. However, after much trickery it seems unlikely that this will happen. The aria Ombra mai fù, which opens the first Act of Xerxes (Serse), is perhaps one of Handel's most popular arias . In a garden, with a summer house on one side, Xerxes addresses affectionate praise to the shade of a plane tree.

The second half of our programme begins with the opening of Act 3 of Handel's oratorio *Solomon* (composed in 1748), the very famous *Sinfonia* known as "The Arrival of the Queen of Sheba". The Queen of Sheba enters Solomon's (her husband's) palace. His reputation as the wisest of the wise among rulers (after settling a dispute between two women about a child who

one claimed to have been stolen), convinced the Queen to take the dangerous long journey through the Arabian desert. Now she stands before him and Solomon receives her with great friendliness and asks his singers and musicians to play sweet music. The Queen is overwhelmed. With moving words they praise God, together with the priest.

Our final work today is the Utrecht Jubilate, composed to celebrate the Treaty of Utrecht, which established the Peace of Utrecht in 1713, ending the War of the Spanish Succession (this had been fought from 1701-13 to ensure that Spain and France did not become a superpower under one monarch and spoil the balance of power in Europe). Handel followed the models of Henry Purcell's 1694 Te Deum and Jubilate. Divided into seven sections, Handel again uses the chorus as the pillars for the structure of this work, and the orchestral accompaniment for each section perfectly complements the flow and meaning of the text.

DR DEBRA SHEARER-DIRIÉ MUSICAL DIRECTOR



Originally from Perth, Dr Debra Shearer-Dirié maintains an active career as a choral conductor, music educator, clinician and scholar. She holds a Master of Music Education degree and Doctor of Music degree in Choral Conducting from Indiana University. During her time there she directed the Indiana University Children's and Youth Choir, was assistant director to maestro Paul Hillier with the Pro Arte Singers, and Director of the International Vocal Ensemble at Indiana University for two years. From 2000 to 2001, she conducted the Northwest Girlchoir in Seattle, a 400-voice organization of young women who perform frequently with the Seattle Symphony Orchestra.

Debra has received numerous invitations to present at national conferences both abroad and in Australia, including the National Conference of the American Choral Director's Association in New York in 2003, and most recently, her third Australian National Choral Association (ANCA) conference in July this year.

Upon arriving in Brisbane mid 2003, she conducted the Queensland Young Conservatorium Chamber Choir through diverse repertoire which led to an invitation to perform at the ANCA conference in 2004. In 2005, she was appointed Musical Director of Brisbane Concert Choir, and in 2006 founded Vox Pacifica Chamber Choir. In 2009 she founded Fusion, a semii professional adult a capella ensemble. She continually searches for opportunities to collaborate with other musical groups, composers, dancers, visual artists and cultural groups.

Debra lectures in the School of Music at the University of Queensland and is currently serving as editor of the ANCA journal *Sing Out*, and on the national ANCA committee. She is in demand as an adjudicator, clinician and conductor for festivals and eisteddfods throughout Australia and the Asia-Pacific region.

JOHN WOODS KEYBOARD

John was born in Stirling, Scotland and studied at the Royal Scottish Academy of Music and Drama, Glasgow, and the Royal Northern College of Music, Manchester. Prior to joining the staff of the Queensland Conservatorium he worked for the RNCM, the Hong Kong Academy for Performing Arts and Granada Television. He has accompanied singers and instrumentalists throughout the UK, Europe and Australia, on the concert platform and in radio and television broadcasts, and has also accompanied the master classes of several distinguished musicians including Dame Joan Sutherland, Dame Janet Baker and Dame Elisabeth Schwarzkopf.

MONIQUE LATEMORE SOPRANO

Monique has lived and breathed music from an early age. After starting private singing lessons in Primary School and continuing with extensive musical studies at High School, Monique was accepted into the Queensland Conservatorium of Music, where she completed a Bachelor of Music in Advanced Performance, and last year a Graduate Certificate in Performance. During her time at the conservatorium, Monique has performed roles including 'La Speranza' in L'Orfeo (Monteverdi), 'Amor' in Orfeo ed Euridice (Gluck), 'Marina' in School for Fathers (Wolf-Ferrari),

'Michel' in Saul (Handel) and 'Third Spirit' in Cendrillon (Massenet). As part of the Conservatorium's Opera Class Scenes, Monique performed excerpts from Der Freischütz (Weber) & Don Giovanni (Mozart) in the role of Ännchen and Zerlina respectively. Monique has performed previously with the Brisbane Concert choir as soprano soloist in works including The Seasons (Haydn) and Dona Nobis Pacem (Vaughan Williams). She has sung 'Second Fairy' in A Midsummer Night's Dream (Mendelssohn) with Southern Cross Soloists, and has recently performed the Poems from the Chinese (Betty Beath) as part of the Conservatorium's Encounters Festival.

Last year, Monique was awarded joint winner of the Elizabeth Muir Memorial Postgraduate Prize at the Old Conservatorium and selected as a reserve semi-finalist and performer in masterclasses for the Mietta Song Recital Award. Monique was also awarded first place in several sections in the Brisbane Eisteddfod, including the Operatic Aria Final. In January, Monique was awarded a scholarship to participate in the Sound Thinking Summer School Performance Workshop and also performed as a soloist and ensemble member in *Opera by Candlelight* held in Canberra for both the opening and encore concert. As well as completing her Masters in Music Studies degree this year, Monique has performed as soprano soloist in John Adam's work *Grand Pianola Music* with the Queensland Symphony Orchestra in March, and next month will perform Mozart's *Great Mass* with the Brisbane Chorale. Later this year, Monique will perform the role of Lauretta in Puccini's *Gianni Schicchi* as part of the Conservatorium's major opera production.

NICOLIE JENKINS ALTO

Nicki works as a dentist and has always enjoyed singing. She was awarded AMusA in 2002 and completed a Graduate Certificate in Music Studies at the Queensland Conservatorium in 2003.





LAURA COUTTS SOPRANO

Born in 1988, Laura Coutts hails from Brisbane Australia. Classically trained in voice at the Queensland Conservatorium, Laura started her musical journey at the tender age of 8 when she joined the Queensland Children's Choir. From age 12 she took private singing lessons and competed in numerous competitions and completed numerous AMEB singing exams. Laura was awarded the Pine Rivers Shire Bursary, and the Elizabeth Muir Scholarship and Linda Edith Allen Prize, both from the Queensland Conservatorium. Along the way, she has had leading

roles in operas and musicals: Pat Nixon in *Nixon in China*, Merab in *Saul*, Cobweb in *A Midsummer Night's Dream*, Anna in *The King and I* and Maria in *West Side Story*.

In 2008, she was asked to perform with belladiva, a pop-opera sextet, and is continuing to perform with them for various corporate and private functions, festivals and stage shows.

THE CHOIR

The Brisbane Concert Choir at St Andrew's is an auditioned adult mixed voice choir. Formed in 1996 by Dr Guy Jansen, the choir has established an excellent reputation for its performances of diverse repertoire ranging from a cappella pieces to full symphonic works. Performances have included appearances with The Queensland Orchestra, Queensland Orchestra Pops prestigious festivals such as Brisbane Cathedrals Week and the 4MBS Festival of Classics. The Choir toured the North Island of New Zealand in 1999 and in June 2002, following the release of its first CD, Journey, the choir embarked on a very successful tour to north Queensland. The choir has recorded performances for broadcast on ABC-TV and 4MBS Classic-FM. 2008 saw the release of a new CD, Radiance, and a first European tour to Prague, Salzburg and Vienna. The choir will tour to Italy in September 2011.
