Musical Director

Dr Debra Shearer-Dirié



Dr. Debra Shearer-Dirié, originally from Perth, Western Australia, is currently established in Brisbane. With a Bachelor of Music Education degree from the University of Western Australia, Dr Shearer-Dirié began her teaching career in the public and private elementary and high schools of WA. Here she taught both instrumental and choral music. After an exciting encounter with the teachers from the Kodály Intezét in Kecskemét, Hungary, she was accepted into the diploma program and spent the academic year of 1990-91 studying in Hungary. The high standard of music education that she observed there made her eager to

return to her own country to develop a similar system. She was invited to give several in-service sessions for the music educators in WA and was a clinician for the Australian Kodály Society to assist in spreading the word of Kodály and improving the standard of music education in Australia.

Dr Shearer-Dirié holds a Master of Music Education and Doctorate of Music degrees from Indiana University in the United States.. After the completion of a Master of Music Education she turned her sights to choral conducting in pursuit of a Doctoral Degree (with minors in Music Education, Ethnomusicology, and Music History). While studying conducting with Mr Robert Porco, Dr Thomas Dunn and Dr Jan Harrington, Dr Shearer-Dirié became experienced in a broad selection of music. With such a profound composition department at Indiana University, Dr Shearer-Dirié also premiered several contemporary works such as: Jason Haney's An Die Musik, Gerardo Dirié's All is Water and Tonos de Archangel. During her time at Indiana University she was director of the Indiana University Children's and Youth Choir; assistant director to Paul Hillier with the Pro Arte Singers; and director of the International Vocal Ensemble at Indiana University for two consecutive years. From 2000-2001 she was selected as Artistic Director of the Northwest Girlchoir in Seattle Symphony Orchestra, directed by Gerard Schwarz.

After completing her dissertation, Dr Shearer-Dirié was invited to present at the National Conference of the American Choral Director's Association in New York 2003, and at the Australian National Choral Association (ANCA) National conferences in 2004 and 2006. She was appointed Musical Director of Brisbane Concert Choir, and in 2006 founded the Vox Pacifica Chamber Choir, a 16 voice auditioned youth chamber choir. She teaches at the Undergraduate and Graduate levels at the University of Queensland as well as mentoring young conductors in the Queensland region. She is in demand as an adjudicator, clinician, educator and conductor. In 2007 and 2008, Dr Shearer-Dirié served as guest editor for the ANCA National Journal and currently serves on the Queensland State ANCA committee. Her work in 2008 will take her to Perth, Copenhagen, New Zealand, Canberra and Europe.

Guest Accompanist—Dr Steven Nisbet

Dr Steven Nisbet has been the organist at St Andrew's Uniting Church (Creek St) since 1978. Prior to that he was organist at Wesley Methodist Church, Kangaroo Point for 14 years, and St Andrew's Anglican Church, South Brisbane for 1 year. As a church organist, Steven enjoys playing rousing recessionals at the conclusion of church services, and has written many reharmonisations and descants for final verses of hymns (90 at the last count). Steven's interest in music range from the classics to jazz and light popular music, as demonstrated by his series of concerts entitled "Pop Goes the Organ" at St Andrew's in recent years. Other recent performances include a recital at Brisbane City Hall in October last year, lunch-time concerts in September and October this year at St Andrew's and an "Organ Spectacular" also in October at St Andrew's.

Steven is the President of the Organ Society of Queensland and is actively involved in the promotion of organ music in the community. This has included presenting a number of demonstration/recitals entitled "Let the Organ Thunder" in the past three years at the Brisbane City Hall. He has also conducted series of tutorials for church organists in many areas of South-East Queensland. By profession, Steven is a Senior Lecturer in Mathematics Education at Griffith University. His doctoral studies were on children's learning of mathematics and music.

Rehearsal Accompanist—Mr John Woods

John was born in Stirling, Scotland and studied at the Royal Scottish Academy of Music and Drama, Glasgow, and the Royal Northern College of Music, Manchester. Prior to joining the staff of the Queensland Conservatorium he worked for the RNCM, the Hong Kong Academy for Performing Arts and Granada Television. He has accompanied singers and instrumentalists throughout the UK, Europe and Australia, on the concert platform and in radio and television broadcasts, and has also accompanied the master classes of several distinguished musicians including Dame Joan Sutherland, Dame Janet Baker and Dame Elisabeth Schwarzkopf.

Programme Notes



It does seem a little premature to be thinking of Christmas celebrations in the middle of November, but it is never too early to be singing the stunning choral music that is associated with the Christmas season. Amongst some of the most beautiful Christmas music comes such phrases as "Angels, from the realms of glory," "A spotless rose is blooming, sprung from a tender root", "The Prince of Peace," "Mary, being great with child," "When they saw the star, they rejoiced with exceeding great joy," and "when peace shall over all the earth its ancient splendours fling". These words bring such feelings of joy, beauty and peacefulness. I hope your Christmas season brings the same delights over the coming months.

It is with much excitement that the Brisbane Concert Choir will be taking this same repertoire to the beautiful churches and performing venues of Prague, Salzburg and Vienna. The singers of the Brisbane Concert Choir have worked incredibly hard this year both musically and financially to make this trip possible. I would like to thank all who have contributed to making this event happen.

Our programme this evening begins with a piece by the American composer William Billings (1746-1800), who is considered by many to be the foremost representative of Colonial American music. Born in Boston he was largely self-trained in music. His *Shiloh* uses a text taken from the Old Testament. The word 'Shiloh' is a Hebrew word used by Isaiah the prophet which means "Messiah" and foretells the birth of Jesus 600 years before the event. This song first appeared in The Suffolk Harmony in 1786 and adopts the singing idioms of the shape-note tradition of North America.

Andrew Carter's (b. 1939) A Maiden Most Gentle was the first of his carols to be sung at the Christmas Eve service at King's, Cambridge. The gentle melodic line that leads us through each verse moves through various textural changes, ending each time with the women's voices on the text "Ave Maria" (Hail Mary).

Another musical contribution in honour of the Virgin Mary is Maríukvæði *Hymn to Mary* by Þhorkell Sigurbjörnsson (b. 1938). This Icelandic hymn creates a beautifully evocative Nordic atmosphere as it sets three verses which are attributed to Jon Arasón, Iceland's last Catholic bishop. Each verse consists of a solo soprano melody, beautiful in its simplicity, and a choral refrain which awakens us from the modal qualities of the solo soprano.



One night in 1328, the German mystic and Dominican monk Henrich Suso (c.1300-1366) had a vision in which he joined angels dancing as the angels sang to him *Nun singet und seid froh* or *In Dulci Jubilo* (In sweet jubilation). *In Dulci Jubilo* is among the oldest and most famous of the "macaronic" songs, one which combines Latin and a vernacular language, in this case English.

Kenneth Leighton's (1929-1988) A Hymn of the Nativity sets the text of Richard Crashaw (c.1613-1649) in a mini-cantata set for chorus and soprano solo. The solo line opens the piece with a simple melody gathering excitement at the birth of Jesus which is shortly accompanied by unison chorus. The harmonic language almost contributes as an extra cradle to the words as it moves from unison to the most beautiful harmonies accentuating every word. The middle section employs exciting imitative entries to the text of "Welcome, to our wond'ring sight", rising to the declamation of the "Great little one, whose glorious birth lifts earth to Heav'n". This work concludes with a return to the gentle nature of the opening and the return of the soprano soloist.

Carúl Loch Garman or the Wexford Carol is a traditional religious Irish Christmas Carol origination from County Wexford dating to the 12th century. The subject of the song is that of the nativity of Jesus Christ.

The Seven Joys of the Virgin (or of Mary, the Mother of Jesus) is a popular devotion to events of the life of the Blessed Virgin Mary, arising from a trope of medieval devotional literature and art. Originally, there were five joys of the Virgin. Later, that number increased to seven, nine, and even fifteen in medieval literature, although seven remained the commonest number, and others are rarely found in art. The seven joys are usually listed as the Annunciation, Nativity of Jesus, Adoration of the Magi, Resurrection of Christ, Ascension of Christ to Heaven, Pentecost, and the Coronation of the Virgin.

The Danish composer Niels La Cour (b. 1944) sets the Latin text *Hodie Christus natus est* (Today Christ is born) in a simple a cappella setting allowing the Latin text to govern the rhythmic flow of the music. The *Hodie* comes from his Three Latin Motets composed in 1982

The final piece in this first half of this evening's programme is *Bring Rest, Sweet Dreaming Child* by British born composer Tarik O'Regan (b. 1978). It is a carol setting of a poem by Mark Pryce, which in his own words, 'reflects on the birth of the Christ-child who comes into the anxiety, noise and loneliness of the contemporary city, with its varied threats and fear of neighbour'.

A maiden most gentle and tender we sing: Of Mary the mother of Jesus our King. Ave Maria.

How bless'd is the birth of her heavenly child, Who came to redeem us in Mary so mild. Ave Maria.

The archangel Gabriel foretold by his call The lord of creation, and Saviour of all.

Three Kings came to worship with gifts rich and rare,
And marvelled in awe at the babe in her care.

Rejoice and be glad at this Christmas we pray;
Sing praise to the Saviour, sing endless 'Ave".

Originally written for chorus and harp, this evening's performance will accompany the voices on piano with its gently dissonances reminding us of the many unforeseen events that took place on the journey to Bethlehem and then following the birth.

Gaspar Fernandes (1566-1629) was a Portuguese composer and organist spending some time working in Mexico. He was a composer noted for his work in the vernacular. *Xicochi conetzintle* is an exquisite lullaby set in Nahuatl, the language of the Aztecs of central Mexico.

In O Magnum Mysterium, Jacol Handl (1550-1591) makes use of the Venetian polychoral style called cori spezzati, or separated choirs. The text is a responsorial chant from the Matins of Christmas and set here in a simplistic way to allow the text to be clearly understood. The second piece on the programme by Handl is Jerusalem gaude. This six-part motet treats the women and men parts of the choir as if they were two choir again creating an antiphonal texture.

Juan de Araujo (1646-1712) is proposed to be South America's greatest composer of the early to mid-Baroque and to be the last significant voice of the older Iberian tradition. Born in Spain, he moved to Lima with his family but was banished for some years from Lima by the then Viceroy, moving to Panama and then being ordained to the priesthood. He later returned to Lima as maestro of the Cathedral, and served his last post at the Cathedral of La Plate in Bolivia. He composed many villancicos, of which Los coflades de la estleya is one, which makes use of Cuban and West African rhythmic patterns. The subtitle 'Black song for the birth of our Lord' gives us a taste of the seasonal celebrations by the African slaves.

We conclude this evenings performance with three pieces by living composers, the Danish composer Michael Bojesen (b. 1960), and Australian composers Michael Leighton Jones and Ralph Morton. Each piece takes a well-known text and unites it with a musical language that creates, in each piece, and impressive timbral palette.

I hope you enjoy this evening's concert and I look forward to seeing you for our 2009 season.
